DIRECTOR'S NOTE:

I think it goes without saying, but I'll say it anyway - this has been a WEIRD year. I remember last May, as I was making plans for the LSB 2020-2021 season, thinking there was no way we wouldn't have a regular season of shows, there was no way things wouldn't be "back to normal." Ha. Needless to say, this LSB season was far from regular. And in a lot of ways, it was better.
